Children and Young People Safeguarding

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)

Colleagues from the NHSE/I National FGM Group have created this <u>newsletter</u> which provides some useful updates on prevalence, law, culture and society, religion and arts.

The following publication is based on a piece of research which included our region, Bristol, and was undertaken by Dr Saadye Ali who is also a registered nurse. The study examined how young people living in FGM affected communities in the United Kingdom interpreted and explained FGM. There are some useful learning points within this <u>document</u> which remind us of the importance of working 'with' communities on this issue rather than 'on' or 'to' them. This paper has been discussed at the National NHSE/I FGM group.

Deprivation of liberty and 16-17 year olds

Co-written by Research in Practice and 39 Essex Chambers, this really helpful practice guidance aims to help professionals identify when a deprivation of liberty may be occurring in the context of a 16 or 17-year-old, in particular in light of the Supreme Court decision in ReD in 2019, and to provide key pointers as to what should happen at that stage.

They recently passed the alpha phase assessment and are now on the final build stage of the project. The updated platform will be launched in the autumn with a new landing page to access the modules.


Many of you will be aware that there is a new Bill being discussed in Parliament, please follow this <u>Link</u> for more information.

Modern Slavery



A systematic review was undertaken by colleagues from University Hospitals Coventry and Warwickshire NHS Trust and Coventry University to evaluate all eligible national and international qualitative evidence to determine the impact of human trafficking with sexual violence on the health and wellbeing of women and their babies. This <u>resource</u> is a product of the research looking at the experience of vulnerable women accessing antenatal care.

Mental Capacity Act case law

The Vice President's judgment- reported as **London Borough of Tower Hamlets v PB [2020] EWCOP 34** - emphasises the importance of not setting too high a test for capacity in issues such as residence and care. The judge held that:

- 1. the fact PB seriously overestimated his ability to keep his alcohol use under control was not enough to establish a lack of capacity;
- 2. not every addict in some degree of denial can be regarded as incapacitous; and
- 3. the requirement to be able to understand the "reasonably foreseeable consequences" of a particular decision does not mean that the relevant person must accept the professions' view that they will not be able to control their drinking.

Serious Violence and Violence Reduction Units

Addressing the "shadow pandemic" through a public health approach to violence prevention' is an

article which has recently been published in Journal of Community Safety and Wellbeing. You can access the article here. It derives from some work undertaken in Wales by the Multi agency Wales Violence Prevention Unit.

As an overview, the article highlights early trends in monitoring data on the impact of COVID-19 restrictions on violence, including likely increases in domestic and sexual violence and abuse, concerns over the safety of children and young people, both online and in the home, and increased reporting of elder abuse.

The article supports the notion of a shadow pandemic, emphasizing the lack of data that routinely measures violence in the home and online that disproportionately affects women, children, and older people, as well as vulnerable and minority populations. This renders these forms of violence much less "visible" to policy-makers in comparison with violence in public spaces, but they are of no less public health significance.

July 2020 the first edition of the Vulnerability Knowledge and Practice Programme is published. Spotlight on exploitation, county lines, threats and weapons: Learning from two serious case reviews. While this is a police brief, the linked reports have lessons for other agencies within local systems too. Read more
