OUR PEOPLE

We are delighted to be receiving £72,000 from NHS England & Improvement to directly support the wellbeing of our people, made available to each of the ten main English ambulance trusts through a reallocation of funding from schemes that have been reprioritised.

The funding will be utilised to provide immediate additional support for the mental health and wellbeing of the ambulance workforce in recognition of the challenges currently being faced across the sector.

FLEET

In June's edition of 24/7 we shared that the Trust had started taking delivery of 136 new Fiat dual-crewed ambulances – the largest single deployment in SWASFT history, increasing our DCA fleet

ACTIVITY LEVELS AND MILITARY ASSISTANCE

The Trust continued to experience incredibly high incident numbers throughout August. During the week commencing 23 August the Trust recorded over 21,000 incidents with over 3,000 incidents on 4 of the 7 days.

Whilst this is a slight decrease on the record breaking numbers from July (24,000 incidents in a week) it is over 18% higher than figures on the equivalent week 2 years ago and nearly 17% higher than the same week last year. From the 12 to the 31 August, SWASFT received assistance from a small number of military personnel at various ambulance stations and hospital emergency departments across the region.

We are extremely grateful for their support during this sustained period of increased demand which enabled us to get more of our vehicles back on the road, getting our patients the urgent care and treatment they need sooner.

New Raizer Lifting Chair for Lynton and Lynmouth community first responders

EMERGENCY SERVICES MENTAL HEALTH CONVEYANCE ALTERNATIVE

As of Thursday 15 July, our crews based in Bristol, North Somerset, and South Gloucestershire (BNSSG) have been able to utilise a new service which aims to reduce on-scene times and provide alternative options to conveying patients with mental health difficulties to A&E departments.

The Avon and Wiltshire Mental Health Partnership (AWP) NHS Trust Street Triage Team is available to refer SWASFT patients to the Bristol Sanctuary and the Safe Haven Crisis Centre in Weston-super-Mare, where they can access help and support for their mental health condition in a therapeutic environment and dedicated one-to-one support from engagement workers who are skilled in de-escalation. Here, patients will be able to access help and support for their mental health condition in a therapeutic and calming environment, including dedicated one-to-one support from engagement workers who are skilled in de-escalation. Follow-up for further clinical assessment will be provided by the Street Triage clinicians in person or remotely.

BATH FALLS TEAM REPRESENTS SWASFT AT #ENDPJPARALYSIS GLOBAL SUMMIT

In mid-July the Bath falls team represented SWASFT at the #EndPJparalysis summit 2021, helping to put us on the world stage for our development of inter-agency working to support elderly fallers in the community.

The summit brings together clinicians, carers and people with lived experience to share best

practice, research and raise awareness about the devastating, and often preventable, impact of deconditioning – a process of physiological change following a period of inactivity, bedrest or sedentary lifestyle. The Bath falls team is made up of paramedics, occupational therapists and a physiotherapist and is a collaboration between SWASFT, Royal United Hospital Bath and Virgin Care funded by the local CCG. The team has been serving its local communities for the past four years, seven days a week 0800–1800 hrs by responding to 999 calls for people who have fallen, or those who are frail and at risk of falling. Last year the team attended over 1,600 incidents and on average 74% of patients are discharged at scene. This data highlights the excellent care that our people are delivering to our patients.
