## **NEWS FROM THE ALLIANCE**

- We are delighted to announce Lyndel Moore will be joining us as the TVCA Nurse Lead from April 20<sup>th</sup> 2021, on a 2 days a week basis. Lyndel, a nurse by background, who many of you will know in her current role as Deputy Divisional Director Head of Cancer services at Great Western Hospital, will form part of our clinical team led by Jen. Lyndel will provide the professional nurse leadership across cancer services in TVCA engaging with trust lead cancer nurses, clinical tumour groups, AHP's and primary care. Lyndel will be integral in developing many of our landmark programmes; implementing rapid diagnostic services, cancer workforce development and ensuring our increasing group of patient representatives are central in informing our programmes. - Lung Cancer Awareness Campaign (Weeks 5 6):

Dr Anant Sachdev has also recorded a <u>lung cancer awareness video</u> for a local CCG, which can also be cascaded more widely. The **Cancer Allies Programme**, working with local community organisations and leaders, is looking at developing further bespoke messages for lung cancer awareness as well as for other tumour sites.

## OTHER CANCER UPDATES

- On Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> March, the <u>2021/2022 Priorities and Operational Planning Guidance</u> was published and the recovery of cancer services continues to be a priority.
  - The section on cancer in the Planning Guidance states that local systems, drawing on advice and analysis from their Cancer Alliance, should ensure that there is sufficient diagnostic and treatment capacity in place to meet the needs of cancer. Specifically, systems should plan to:
    - Return the number of people waiting for longer than 62 days to the level we saw in
       February 2020 (or to the national average in February 2020 where this is lower); and,
    - Meet the increased level of referrals and treatment required to address the shortfall in number of first treatments by March 2022.

TVCA will be working closely with trusts, CCG's and ICS systems to ensure a single plan for cancer is jointly agreed to deliver optimal recovery and ongoing transformation of cancer services to deliver the long term plan priorities for cancer.

- RCN Position Statement on Registered Nursing Associates (RNAs) Training in Cervical Screening
   The RCN has <u>issued a statement</u> acknowledging that they recognise that RNAs carry out cervical
   screening, in line with national standards. Service and education providers should be confident
   that appropriate and relevant training and supervision is in place and aware that extra training
   may be required.
- PHE Screening 'Advice for women following COVID-19 vaccination':

On 08 March, a message from Public Health England was sent out to all health systems regarding advice for women following a COVID-19 vaccination. The key points were as follows:

- <u>BMJ article</u> (Mar 2021): advice in the US is that breast screening appointments should be scheduled to take place a) before women receive a first dose of COVID-19 vaccine OR b) 4 to 6 weeks after the second dose where possible
- This is due to the potential reaction of enlarged lymph nodes (lymphadenopathy) on the side of the vaccination, which could cause unnecessary concern
- Also been picked up by the UK press.
- Within England, breast screening service personnel are advised to be **aware** of the potential for enlarged nodes following a COVID-19 vaccination.
- Advice regarding the scheduling of mammograms has not altered.
- Currently **no requirement** for women to be advised to wait for a period of time following a COVID-19 vaccination before attending a screening appointment.
- As per usual practice, women with noted lymphadenopathy at screening must always be recalled for assessment even if they report recent vaccination (to ensure that no other pathology exists).
- It may be useful for clinicians at an assessment appointment to determine the date of a COVID-19 vaccination and the arm in which this was given, where enlarged lymph nodes are being investigated.
- PHE will continue to monitor the evidence in this emerging area and take advice from relevant experts. Updates will be issued as necessary.
- Capsule Cameras: The NHS is trialling miniature capsule cameras, known as a colon capsule endoscopy, which can be swallowed by patients to provide a cancer diagnosis within hours. The cameras will help speed up cancer checks and catch more cancers early when they are easier to treat. An initial group of 11,000 patients will receive these in more than 40 parts of the country.
