OTHER CANCER UPDATES

 NHS England and Improvement have published the 2021/22 <u>Network Contract Directed</u> <u>Enhanced Service</u> (DES) with <u>associated guidance</u> for Primary Care Networks. The contractual start date is 1st April 2021. The <u>Quality Outcomes Framework (QOF) guidance</u> for 2021/22 is also published.

Delivery of the <u>Early Cancer Diagnosis service specification</u> (pages 48-50 in the <u>DES</u>) and the <u>QOF</u> <u>Early Cancer Diagnosis Improvement Module</u> (pages 96-104 in the <u>QOF</u>) will support primary care in responding to both the ongoing challenge posed by the pandemic, and to the opportunity posed by the NHS Long Term Plan ambitions for cancer. Both are updated for 2020/21, to reflect evolving clinical policy and the ongoing context of the pandemic. <u>Best practice guidance</u> for Primary Care Networks to help deliver the service requirements has also been published. See the implementation resources in the guidance for more information to help GPs and PCNs get started:

- A good place to start is the Macmillan <u>QI module</u> and <u>CRUK contract hub;</u>
- An important action that all GPs and PCNs can take right now is to start using the correct <u>SNOWMED code</u> for referrals for suspected cancer so that you have robust safety netting records from the start of the year.

Next steps are to make sure our PCN's are aware of these publications and to work with them to commence delivery.

- Latest news from NHSE: <u>'Covid-Friendly' Cancer Care At Home Extended For More Patients</u>: Last week, the NHS announced that thousands of people with cancer can benefit from 'Covid friendly' treatments from home, which have been extended until the end of the summer. These treatments may be extended until the end of March 2022. More than 30 different drugs are available to treat patients, offering benefits such as fewer hospital visits or a reduced impact on their immune system. Around 8,000 people have already benefitted from the treatment 'swaps' since April helping to maintain cancer treatment in the face of coronavirus with more than 250,000 people starting treatment for cancer since the start of the pandemic.
- **Prostate Cancer UK** have published a <u>report</u> that assesses reasons for the potential under treatment in **black prostate cancer patients**. Prostate Cancer UK organised two focus groups with black men diagnosed with prostate cancer to understand their experience of NHS care following a report by the **National Prostate Cancer Audit (NPCA)** in 2020 that showed that between 2013-2017, a lower proportion of black men with high-risk and locally advanced



prostate cancer received radical treatment, compared to White and Asian patients and patients classified as other.

Thousands of patients set to benefit from five-minute breast cancer treatment. A treatment that cuts the amount of time breast cancer patients spend in hospital from two and a half hours to as little as five minutes. Read more about the new combined treatment called PHESGO, which will be offered to breast cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy.

CCG Index of Cancer Survival PHE has published an update of the CCG index of cancer survival. This covers survival estimates for adults diagnosed from 2003 to 2018 and followed up to 2019. The publication includes the all-cancer survival index and separate estimates for cancer survival for breast, colorectal and lung.

Summarised top lines are here:

- The all cancer one-year survival rate has increased from 63.6% in 2003 to 73.9% for patients • diagnosed in 2018. There have also been increases for five-year survival (54.6% for patients diagnosed in 2014) and ten-year survival (45.7% for patients diagnosed in 2009).
- Variation in the all cancer one-year survival rate has narrowed across Alliances, with the ٠ difference of 8.2% age points between the best and worst performing Alliances in 2003 decreasing to 4.3% age points in 2018. A similar pattern is seen across CCGs.
- Due to a lower rate of long term trend improvement in five-year survival, reaching the LTP • ambition will require us to improve five-year survival by about 4.7% age points over and beyond the baseline (compared to 4% age points estimated at the time of the LTP).

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
